


The Kristin Lavransdatter Trilogy



<u>Donate your returnable cans and</u> <u>bottles</u>. Use the blue bags found in the parish hall.







#### **Queen Maud #42**

in Carson City, Nevada was founded October 20, 2001. They meet the third Saturday of the month at 10am at a Lutheran church, skipping July and August. The lodge hosts an annual one-day Scandinavian festival in October, with Nordic crafts, gifts, foods, music, demonstrations, samples and exhibits. They participate in Snowshoe Thompson Days (honoring the famous winter mailman of the Sierra Nevada). A Queen Maud member wrote the song "We're Proud to be Daughters of Norway", which has become the GL's anthem.





#### **Lodge Name**

The lodge is named after Queen Maud of Norway, born in London to the Prince and Princess of Wales, who would later become King Edward VII and Queen Alexandra. She married her first cousin, Prince Charles/Carl of Denmark, the second son of King Frederick VIII. When Norway separated from Sweden in 1905, Prince Carl was offered the Norwegian crown, and ruled as King Haakon VII until his death in 1957. Their son was born in England and became King Olav V, who ruled until 1991. The current reigning Norwegian monarch is his son King Harold V. Queen Maud's grandson. Queen Maud earned admiration for supporting charitable organizations and the arts. She adopted Norwegian culture, but as the granddaughter of Queen Victoria she considered Great Britain her true home, and visited every year. She upgraded the stables of the royal palace in Oslo and added English gardens to several royal residences.



## L'Anse aux Meadows Submitted by Linda



Scientists have known for many years that Vikings built a village at L'Anse aux Meadows in Newfoundland around the turn of the millennium. But a study published in Nature is the first to pinpoint the date of the Norse occupation. The explorers — up to 100 people, both women and men — felled trees to build the village and to repair their ships, and the new study fixes a date they were there by showing they cut down at least three trees in the year 1021 — at least 470 years before Christopher Columbus reached the Bahamas in 1492, Previously the date was based only on sagas — oral histories that were written down in the 13th century, at least 200 years after the events they described took place. The scientific key to the exact date that the Norse were there is a spike in a naturally radioactive form of carbon detected in ancient pieces of wood from the site: some cast-off sticks, part of a tree trunk and what looks to be a piece of a plank. Indigenous people occupied L'Anse aux Meadows both before and after the Norse, so the researchers made sure each piece had distinctive marks showing it was cut with metal tools — something the indigenous people did not have. But their stay didn't last long. The research suggests the Norse lived at L'Anse aux Meadows for 3 to 13 years before they abandoned the village and returned to Greenland. # Sabrafted by Cardica



Since our focus this month tends to centralized on a big turkey, I thought it would be a good month to focus on national birds. Most all of the countries around the globe have a national bird that represents their country either officially or unofficially. So let's take a look at our Scandinavian countries national birds. OK

#### **US-BALD EAGLE**



There are nearly 800 species of birds in the United States. The bald eagle was put on the seal on September 16th, 1782, an olive branch in one claw and an arrow in the other represents the power of war and peace. It is considered the ultimate success of the Endangered Species Act as there were only 400 pairs in the 1960s left due to habitat destruction, hunting, and the use of DDT after WWII. The largest known concentration of eagles is in the Klamath Basin, OR. The bald eagle beat out the white eagle for its spot and stands for freedom and strong might and it symbolizes victory and valor. It became our official national bird in 2024.

#### FINLAND-WHOOPER SWAN



The Whooper swan is another large flying bird, reaching 26 to 31 lbs. It's named due to its haunting call. Once you hear it, you'll always recognize it. It is the designated national bird, but it is not official. It symbolizes new beginnings, purity, fidelity, and endurance as they mate for life. They embody Finland's deep connection to wilderness and represents its quiet strength. It was once believed to be the messenger between the living and the dead.

#### SWEDEN-BLACKBIRD

The black is a designated national bird not an official for Sweden. It won a newspaper poll in 1962 for the honor. 'Koltrast' in Swedish, which literally translates to 'coal thrush'. They are known for their beautiful song. They can turn a Swedish morning into a concert. He was chosen for his melodious song representing Sweden's love for music, and for his common presence.

#### **ICELAND-GRYFALCON**

The gryfalcon is one of the largest falcons, of which there are over 300 species. Their wingspan can reach as large as 4 feet. It is the official



national bird of Iceland. The **European golden plover is its** unofficial national bird, & although endangered internationally, the **Atlantic puffins are extremely** plentiful in Iceland. The gryfalcon is beautiful as well as a good hunter. It can reach speeds up to 130 mph. It was chosen for its historical, cultural, and symbolic significance & represents the wild nature of the land, & has a long respected history tied to Icelandic culture. It was a valuable trading commodity during the Viking era & the Middle Ages. It is a symbol of royalty & power. The birds beauty & ability to thrive in Iceland's harsh environment made it a cherished creature in history & folklore. It symbolizes resilience & freedom.

#### **DENMARK-MUTE SWAN**

The mute swan was chosen over the Eurasian Skylark as



the official national bird of Denmark in 1984. It was chosen largely because of Hans Christian Andersen's story of the 'Ugly Duckling' It is a native waterfowl to the country. It has snowy white feathers and a long, elegant neck that folds in an S shape. They nest on large mounds fashioned from aquatic plants and often use the same nest year after year & have a tendency to mate for life. It moves with elegant simplicity despite being one of the heaviest flying birds in existence as they can weigh up to 26 lbs. They are appreciated for their beauty and as a reminder that transformation is always possible and there is magic hidden in everyday life.

#### **NORWAY-WHITE THROATED DIPPER (Fossekall)**

The white throated dipper is the only songbird that can dive under-



water & walk along riverbeds. Its abilities seem almost supernatural, reflecting the Norwegians' innovation & resilience. It is the official national bird of Norway, chosen in 1963. It represents Norwegians' ability to thrive in impossible conditions that would defeat most others.

Nils Olav is a distinguished member of The King's Guard. He's a little different from the others though, or I wouldn't be mentioning him. You guessed it, he's a bird! A Penguin. In 1972 he was Lance Corporal Nils Olav & now he has risen up the ranks to become Brigadier Sir Nils

Olav III. (He's the 3<sup>rd</sup> Nils to serve.)**1** ()

- 4. Iceland does not have MacDonald's or Burger King.
- 5. Danish Lurpak® butter is world famous. It can be bought in stores in more than 100 countries worldwide.
- 6. The English are famous for their love of bacon, which they began importing from Denmark in 1867.
- 7. Danes are certified foodies. They are the fifth largest exporter of food in the world, despite their small population.
- 8. Grandiosa frozen pizza is Norway's unofficial national dish.
- 9. Norway's national drink is akevitt, or aquavit.
- 10. Coffee came to Norway about 280 years ago, but it wasn't generally accepted until the 1870s.
- 11. Sweden has the highest number of McDonald's restaurants per capita in Europe, with 227 restaurants. Only the United States has more McDonald's per capita in the world.
- 12. A traditional Swedish drink is glögg, which is the result of mulled wine being poured over aquavit and then set aflame.
- 13. The crayfish party has become one of the most typical of Swedish traditions, held on the first Thursday in August.
- 14. Finnish Mämmi: This black baked rye porridge delicacy, usually enjoyed at Easter time.
- 15. Finland's food culture is a blend of practicality and purpose. It's deeply connected to the land, shaped by the seasons, and guided by a quiet kind of creativity.

## **Judy's Recipe Corner**

SEAFOOD CASSERO<u>LE</u>- Trudy Jacobson Coggan

Trudy Coggan was an aunt who lived in California. I have never had this casserole, but she was quite the hostess, so I expect it was pretty good.

Ingredients

1/2 cup butter divided

1/4 cup flour

2 cups milk

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon Accent

1/2 teaspoon pepper

one can shrimp, rinsed (4 and 1/2 oz)

ı can tuna, rinsed well with hot water if oil packed

ı can sliced mushrooms, drained (4 oz)

(I use the mushroom juice in the cream sauce)

ı can crab meat, (7 1/2 oz)

1/4 pound grated cheddar cheese

2 cups soft bread crumbs


#### Directions-Serves 6

- 1. Melt one half the butter in a saucepan. Stir in the flour. Blend well. Stir in the milk and cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until the mixture thickens. Add the salt, mushrooms, Accent and pepper.
- 2. Grease a 2 guart casserole. Layer the shrimp and cover with the cream sauce. Then layer the tuna and cover with the sauce. Layer the crab and cover with the sauce. Top with 1/4 pound grated cheese. Toss the bread crumbs with the rest of the melted butter and spread over the top.
- 3. Bake at 350° for 1 hour.

#### Notes:

- 1. You will find that the can sizes today vary from what the recipe calls for. They are usually smaller so I get the next size up or use two of the smaller cans. You can use either mild or Sharp cheese.
- 2. It doesn't hurt the recipe to add more of the fish or you can use any extra on a salad.



Headhunters-Nov. 7 This action/suspense thriller is based on the book of the same name by acclaimed Norwegian crime novelist, Jo Nesbø. Roger Brown, the lead character, is one of Norway's most powerful corporate recruiters or "headhunters." His outward bravado and extravagant lifestyle—supported largely by his other business as an art thief—mask his insecurities. The two sides of Roger's professional life intersect when his wife, Diana, who owns an art gallery, introduces him to Clas Greve, the perfect candidate for the CEO position at Roger's company —as well as the owner of a priceless Rubens. (Norway, **2011, 100 minutes)** 



Agent No. 24-Nov. 14 This film is based on the true story of Gunnar Sønsteby, an important figure in the Norwegian resistance during the Nazi occupation of Norway. ("Agent No. 24" was just one of his aliases.) The film examines the conflicted feelings that he and other peace-loving Norwegians had to contend with at a time when their lives, freedoms, and national sovereignty were very much on the line. The film alternates seamlessly between wartime and the recent past, where the now 90-year-old Sønsteby is still speaking in public—in this film, to a high-school class—about why we must fight for freedom and democracy. The film is set in 1940, but it could just as well be now.... (Norway, 2024, 111 minutes)



Home for Christmas Nov. 21

Johanne is in her 30s, single, and works as a nurse. **During an Advent dinner** with her family, they pile on the pressure for her to be in a relationship, so she'll have someone to bring to Christmas dinner later in the month. She then tries to find a boyfriend through speed dating, internet dating, and other means and ends up going on dates with several men—including 18vear-old Jonas, and the much older Bengt Erik. She also has a brief sexual encounter with one of her coworkers. This popular TV-series is simply packed with witty, charming, and unexpected moments. (Norway, 2019, 116 minutes)


