Dear Sisters,

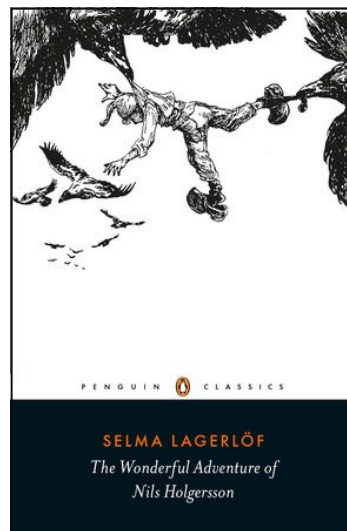

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February is one of the coldest months in Norway with temperatures ranging in the 20–30°F (-7–1°C) range. There are only 8-9 hours of daylight so February is one of the best months before spring to see the northern



lights. It also has the lowest number of foreign travelers. Although most of the mountains

are full of skiers it is said that you can find lots of cozy hotels and festivals.

Festivals like the Birken Skifestival in Rena. Skiers follow the same route that a group of skiers took during Norway's civil war back in 1200 to carry the young prince Haakon Haakonsøn to safety. Participants today are still required to wear a backpack as a symbol of carrying the weight of that child.



You can go to the Ice Music Festival in Finse. This musical event has created a winter setting made of ice, including stages and instruments!

There are many other musical festivals during the month. You can also watch the national reindeer racing championship during the Sámi Festival in Tromsø which runs down the Main Street of the city on February 6th. This is a week long festival (February 2-8) where the Sami culture and heritage are celebrated.

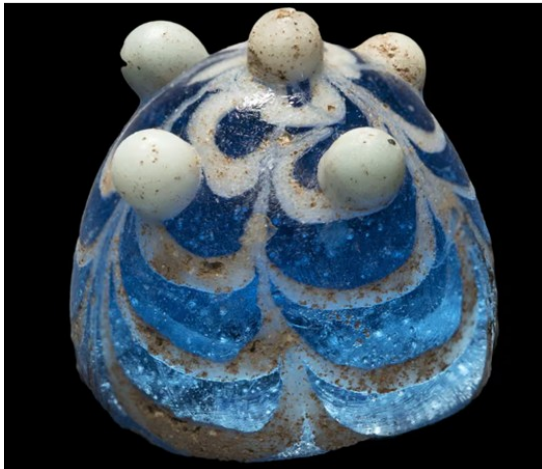

Board-game piece from period of first Viking raid found on Lindisfarne

Small glass 'crown' thought to be rare archaeological link to first Norse raiders. The piece of worked glass unearthed during an excavation on Lindisfarne. *Photograph: Jeff Veitch*

It is not large – the shape and size of a chocolate sweet – and might easily have been discarded as a pebble by a less careful hand.

But a tiny piece of worked glass unearthed during an excavation on Lindisfarne has been revealed to be a rare archaeological treasure linking the Northumbrian island with the Vikings, from the very beginning of one of the

most turbulent periods in English history.

Archaeologists believe the object, made from swirling blue and white glass with a small "crown" of white glass droplets, is a gaming piece from the Viking board game hnefatafl ("king's table"), or a local version of the game.

Whether dropped on the island by a Norse raider or owned by a high-status local imitating their customs, the gaming piece offers a rare tangible link between Lindisfarne's Anglo-Saxon monastery and the culture that eventually overwhelmed it.
